# Renovated Roe Park and Splash Pad Opens!

The first week of August saw the newly renovated Roe Park open up to restore a valued, family-oriented amenity near our neighborhood. The \$2.5 million Roe Park renovation is part of the comprehensive master plan for Overland Park. Work at the 20-acre park began in September 2015.

The renovation is highlighted by a 30-foot by 80-foot "splash pad" which includes a large mist sprayer, water spouts, and a water weave attraction. In addition to the splash pad, the renovation includes new tennis courts, three new picnic shelters, built-in grills, restrooms, and parking.

The largest shelter house has a 20-foot-tall chimney with a custom grill, electrical connections and interior lighting. It is designed for use by large or small groups and may be reserved for special events for a fee.

The renovation also retained the baseball and soccer fields along with the bicycle trails, transforming our park into a tremendous asset so close to Nall Hills. We hope you visit the park soon!

# Metcalf South Update

In early August, the Overland Park City Council voted 11-0 to approve a revised preliminary plan for the new \$80 million 95 Metcalf South project proposed for the site by codevelopers Lane4 Property Group Inc. and The Kroenke Group. It calls for a total of 305,000 square feet of retail in 15 buildings, including a 165,000-square-foot Lowe's Home Improvement store, and 1,248 surface parking spaces.

Back in June, Owen Buckley of Lane 4 spoke to Nall Hills residents at Indian Woods Middle School, to present the latest plans and answer questions from attendants.

The plan was fairly well received, and the NHHA board sent out a brief summary of the meeting content and discussion to NHHA members in a June 29th email.

With this latest approval, the new Lowe's and all of the infrastructure for the new shopping center could be completed by the spring of 2018. The remainder of the vertical construction, which depends on tenants being signed, could take three to five years to build out.

## Outdoor Burning Regulations

Fall is here and with this colorful season, the fallen leaves from our wonderful trees. Do NOT be tempted to burn your leaves (or anything else)!

Fire pits, portable outdoor fireplaces/fire pits, chimineas and Tiki torches are allowed at single family dwellings or duplexes without a permit (these are strictly prohibited at multifamily dwellings).

Detailed Burn Regulations for the city of Overland Park also can be found here:

Key points includes:

- 1.No burning of vegetation, leaves, wastes, or other combustible materials.
- 2. A recreational fire shall not be more than 3 feet in diameter by 2 feet high in dimension.
- 3. Portable outdoor fireplaces/pits shall not be operated

within 15 feet of a structure

- 4. No burning when wind speed exceeds 15 mph.
- 5. Fuel for a recreational fire shall consist only of seasoned dry firewood (dried at least six months)
- 6. Recreational fires must be constantly attended until out, and fire extinguishers are to be available for immediate use.

Please observe these regulations and be safe—for you and your neighbors...thanks!

# Treasurer's Report - Proposed 2016 Budget

Treasurer Mark Able recommends the annual assessment for the year 2017 be set at \$204 per household (a \$5 increase from 2016). The increase in trash service expense is the main reason for the dues increase for 2017. All other expenses are expected to remain at current levels or increase moderately. Mr. Able will address questions and concerns regarding the proposed assessment rate and budget line items at the annual meeting.

A Certified Public accounting firm audits all accounts at the end of each fiscal year. Copies of the audit reports are available at the meeting and are open to public inspection, upon written request to the board of directors. Details regarding current income and expenses and the basis for the recommended budget will be discussed at the annual meeting.

## Meadowbrook Development Underway

Another nearby development is the Meadowbrook project at Nall and Somerset Avenue. When complete is slated to be the largest park in northeast Johnson County, with both public and private investments.

The project attained final approval this past spring and construction got underway in May. Part of the project will replace the 1970s-vintage Meadowbrook clubhouse with a new activity center.

The Meadowbrook park will feature about three miles of biking/walking trails, playgrounds, a balance course, picnic areas, three lakes, sport courts and sculptures through-

The private development will include 53 single-family homes, 70 townhomes, about 330 senior-housing units, about 280 luxury apartment units and a 50-room boutique hotel with 5,000 square feet of retail. The

entire development is expected to take 4-6 years to complete.



## Neighborhood Pets:

We continue to receive phone calls regarding barking dogs in the neighborhood. As a common courtesy, please take responsibility for your animals and help control any excessive barking. # Don't Feel Like Raking Leaves?...Mulch Instead!

The arrival of fall in our neighborhood means the inevitable amount of leaves on our lawns. For those accustomed to raking, there is an easier alternative which actually benefits your lawn-mulch mowing.

An article featured on Kansas State University's website outlines the process, which is just as it sounds. The leaves are mown back into the turf and turned into mulch. Research at Michigan State University has shown this process actually benefits the lawn.

While the process involves more mowing, it greatly reduces the labor of raking and bagging.



## Our Homes, Our Neighborhood - Be a Good Neighbor

### **Trees:**

Many of the trees in Nall Hills are getting older, which results in more dead branches. These present a risk to homes, cars and people. Homeowners should assess this risk and have a licensed, insured service remove dead branches from their trees before they break off.

Any fallen limbs should be bundled in 4 foot sections and put out with the trash. Larger logs may be stacked for firewood or must be removed from the property.

## Trailers, recreational vehicles and boats:

The city of Overland Park has codes and restrictions regarding the parking of trailers, recreational vehicles and boats. Some of the Nall Hills residents use trailers for business and are not aware of the city codes regarding parking of these vehicles.

## **Exterior Storage:**

Nall Hills Homes Association follows the codes established by the City of Overland Park regarding the exterior storage of items. Trash cans and lawn equipment must be stored "within a fully enclosed structure or screened from view from any street or neighboring property."

## Monthly bulky item pickup:

Bulky items: The first week of every month, each homeowner is allowed ONE bulky item to be picked up on their trash day. Restrictions – no appliances and item must not be longer than 5 feet in length.
